After tieing for fifth place in the Hearst National Junior golf tournament last year, George Mackanos spent hours every day at his home Alcoma Golf Club course chipping and putting, attempting to improve that part of his game which he believed had cost him the championship.

Yesterday the constant hours of practice finally paid off in the Pennsylvania Junior championship at Alcoma.

He defeated Bob McMahon of Whitemarsh Valley, Philadelphia, 2 up in the title showdown and in the end it was his chipping and putting which decided rather than the awesome lengths of his drives.

"HE'S PRETTY GOOD," the 16-year-old Philadelphian said after the round. He said it admiringly, as though he'd say Arnold Palmer or Billy Casper were "pretty good."

Mackanos had to be "pretty good" to beat McMahon, who was pretty good himself in the title match. Few had expected him to give the Alcoma ace the struggle he did.
